1. What is EUROWA?





- 9 Network Members in 9 countries
- Initiated in 2015
- Equipment stockpile (Belgium)
- Secretariat provided by Sea Alarm
- Governance Committee + technical subcommittees
- More information www.eurowa.eu

Mission: to support and empower EU authorities, NGOs and polluters in dealing jointly with oiled wildlife using agreed international standards. **Aim**: Representation in the Network of all EU Coastal Countries.

2. How is EUROWA setup?

- Organised around a Charter signed by all members
- EUROWA positioned as European solution for mutual assistance and integrated management of wildlife pollution incidents
- Charter calls on governments to participate
 - Adopt EUROWA nationally
 - Develop national preparedness
 - Support EUROWA internationally
 - Via the Regional Agreements (HELCOM, Bonn, REMPEC)



To provide authorities and wildlife experts with a set of guidelines representing European standards of oiled wildlife response






To get wildlife expertise trained Nationally / Regionally / Locally and be better prepared for an incident




A. Pool of expertise

- EUROWA can assist European authorities during emergency situations
- Activated via EU Civil Protection Mechanism
- Qualified EUROWA experts form Tier 3 international team, that provides <u>support</u> to and <u>integrates with</u> :
 - local first response teams (Tier 1)
 - national experts (Tier 2)

• EUROWA Training Portfolio with 6 qualification levels

- o Hands-on levels
 - 1. BASIC
 - 2. ADVANCED
 - 3. SPECIALIST (includes VETERINARIANS)
- o <u>Management levels</u>
 - 4. SECTION HEAD
 - 5. MANAGER
- EUROWA specific levels
 - 6. EUROWA TEAM
- Courses combine lectures, hands-on training, skill labs, exercises & evaluation of individual skills
- Based on a train the trainer system
- Sea Alarm keeps a central register of all accredited individuals
- Training qualifications allow you to follow specific training paths.


